Local Swedes gather to learn more about ancestral farming practices

Our April 9 program featured Darel F. Swenson, a Twin Cities trial lawyer and educator who is also the president of Stubbhult, Sweden, Inc., a Minnesota non-profit corporation dedicated to promoting in America the work and objectives of the Emadalens, Naturskyddsforening, an environmental protection society in Smaland. That organization

owns and operates the Stubbhult farm, once owned by visionary small-scale Swedish farmer Ingvar Jonsson. Mr. Swenson's presentation of the farm and its occupants included a narrated photo montage and period music. We had no idea there were so many Swedes living in Golden Valley—63 were in attendance and many spoke Swedish!
