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
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October meeting...

Zdon to reveal origins of World War II slang

World War II slang like "Kilroy Was Here" is going to be the featured program at the October 8 General Membership meeting with Al Zdon. Zdon is Communications Director of the Minnesota American Legion and editor of the American Legion newspaper, the Official Newspaper of the American Legion in Minnesota. The Minnesota Legionnaire newspaper was started as the Hennepin County Legionnaire in 1920. Published monthly by the Minnesota Department of the American Legion, it is now in its 90th year.

Zdon was the long time editor of the Hibbing Daily Tribune and has written two books, "One

This past year was not without its challenges, and it was with sadness that we noted the passing of JACK SCHULTZ. Jack and his wife SHIRLEY are the largest benefactors in the history of our Society, and the reason why the Society building survives for our use today. Jack was also most recently a GVHS board of directors member, and he will be greatly missed.

For the most part, the Society building decided to cooperate in 2008-2009 fiscal year. Unfortunately however, the heat exchanger on the furnaces finally gave up the ghost. But when you're dealt lemons, you make lemonade, so we took the "opportunity" to revitalize the HVAC system to include central air-conditioning, a much needed and appreciated improvement, especially by our many brides.

Another modest revenue generator for the Society that seems to get more popular each year is our annual "Antiques Roadshow". It was literally standing room only in 2009 and we even had to turn a few people away, we had so many objects for appraisal.

While meeting many of these short-term goals over the last year has been fun and rewarding, at the same time, we've also got our eye on the tougher long-term goals: revenue, membership, marketing, building/museum/exhibits, and leadership development are all items that we continue to revisit to make sure the Society stays on track and is headed in the direction that we want it to be going. It's an ambitious program and some of the challenges ahead are formidable. But we remain hopeful for the future, and we're confident that our existing and prospective partners in the Golden Valley community will join us in ensuring the continued success of the Golden Valley Historical Society in the 2009-2010 fiscal year.
