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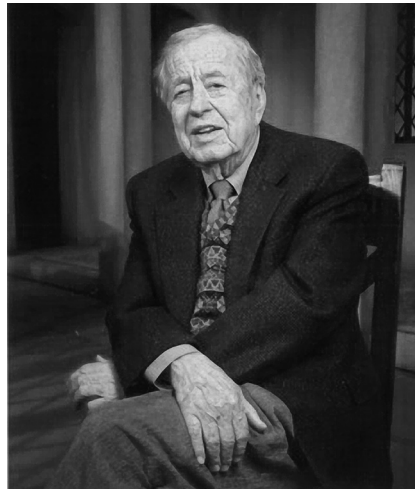

## Theater, media pioneer Stolz to address Society

Actor, writer, producer, and director Don Stolz is best known as the guiding force behind the Old Log Theater, but he is also a radio veteran and played a pioneering role in the growth of television in the Twin Cities. His broadcasting career began in 1938 at WKY Radio in Oklahoma City, where he starred in the network program Devil's Roost.

Stolz bought the Old Log Theater in Excelsior in 1946 and soon became heavily involved in the Twin Cities broadcast scene, acting for WCCO Radio and directing all the television commercials produced by Campbell

## Remember GV movie theater?

Today the City of Golden Valley is surrounded by other cities that have movie theaters, but Golden Valley's only theater was lost to the competition from the new media—television. In 1948, Hobart Williams and Joseph Powers purchased a garage building owned by the Medicine Lake Bus Company, across the road just south of the Point Restaurant, in what is now the "downtown" area of Golden Valley. They converted the bus garage to a theater, which opened

in 1949 with a gala event and a sellout crowd. Flowers and well wishes from Hollywood filled the foyer, but the competition from the new media, television, was a disaster for many theaters, Golden Valley Theater included. The building was subsequently sold to Dahlberg Electronics, was remodeled, and was home to one of the first organizations in Golden Valley with a national and worldwide business—Miracle Ear Hearing Aid.

The Story of Clellan Card and Axel and His Dog," presented the life of one of the important figures in Twin Cities broadcasting from the 1930's to the 1960's at the Society's January 14 general membership meeting. In his research, West interviewed over 116 people,

some more than once as noted in his presentation. Sometimes people's memories were not as accurate as he would have liked and they were re-interviewed to verify their story. West's presentation, which included video and audio clips was well received by the 32 members and guests in attendance.
