Long time resident Edward Jordan dies

Edward Jordan, one of the 11 oldest residents of Golden Valley, passed away on October 15 after a brief illness. Jordan had just celebrated his 98th birthday. A prominent Golden Valley resident, he served on the Planning Commission for several years and was a contractor and developer in the City. He built and operated the strip shopping center on the West side of Winnetka Ave just north of Golden Valley Road before it was acquired by the City and the land was redeveloped for new commercial and residential uses. A very friendly person, Jordan was always eager to tell about his own and his family's history in our community. He also was a Life Member of the Golden Valley Historical Society. Jordan was honored at two special luncheons at the Golden Valley Golf and Country Club for Golden Valley's longest residents, the last this past year as part of the 125th Anniversary of the City of Golden Valley. Dry fall drains Minnehaha Falls

Minnehaha Falls is dry! No water falls over this famous landmark due to our severe drought conditions...the driest recorded since the 1930's. Member Cathy Waldhauser says: If you still have hoses out, deep water your trees, evergreens and any new plants before the ground freezes, and have 3-4 inches of insulating mulch around your plants and over any exposed soil.
