seum during the coming year. A grand opening will be held after the now vacant room is furnished with the heritage of our community. Watch our newsletter for the date and time.

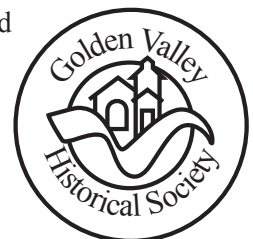
Richie regales with remembrances of Robbinsdale

His accounts of the founders of the city, the early businesses, Whiz Bang Days, parades, the history of Captain Billy, and of course the round-a-bout at the entrance to Robbinsdale from Minneapolis, entertained 37 members and guests.

Not too many years ago we also had the Halloween Blizzard, but we had early warnings from modern weather forecasts and few, if any, deaths occurred.
